Pastor's Reflections

Early last month on a cold snowy morning youth from Christ UCC and their Mentors traveled to Chagrin Falls for a Retreat. I was blessed to accompany them and challenged by their discussion topic of Environmental Justice. The leader was Rev. Michael Howard, Minister of Faith in Action for our Living Water Association.

Retreats often begin with some sort of "get to know you" activity. I appreciated this because I still don't feel that I know the youth from church well enough. We started with a ball of yarn and created a web. I've done this before in other settings and always note that when someone, anyone, tugs on their yarn the entire web is affected.

I remembered the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who said in his Letters from Birmingham Jail, "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly."

King's "Letter from Birmingham Jail" is important to the long philosophical tradition concerned with defining the concept of justice. In this important passage from early in the letter, King argues that justice cannot exist when people permit injustice to persist.

We are all woven together like this web, and if one person in a society is suffering, we all feel the tension. No matter the laws or customs that exist, there is no escaping these important human connections; if one person in a society is harmed directly, others will suffer indirectly from this harm. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s argument is a powerful explanation of why injustice should be a concern for all, not just a limited or finite few. So, what is justice?

Lisa Yeagley spent time and a late-night conversation trying to help the youth and mentors define "What is justice?" and they focused it on the Orrville community - specifically around the topic of food insecurity. They talked about who in the Orrville community is included and who is not. They talked about who makes justice in our community happen?

The youth were engaged in some tough questions and statements that were presented and discussed. Some bullet points that were shared by our leader included:

- •If justice work robs someone of dignity it is not justice work.
- •Ask yourself, was a situation you sense being wrong made by God or humanity? If you can't tell, that's what justice looks like.
- •Justice is love made public.

The youth were divided into discussion groups where they made presentations that were videotaped, and Kaylene Holderman is working on getting these into a format that can be shared with the congregation.

I hope you will also wrestle with these questions and statements. I know that I am. My thoughts turn to the prophet Amos in chapter 5 selected verses. The Lord says:

Seek good and not evil, that you may live, and so the Lord, the God of hosts, will be with you. Hate evil and love good, and establish justice in the gate. Let justice roll down like water and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream.

I shared these thoughts at church council in January and had each person name a justice issue that they were compassionate and concerned about. These included: climate change, food insecurity, our political climate, child safety, immigration, mass incarceration, and more.

Personally, I think it is hard to define justice. But when I hear and see things that my gut tells me are wrong, I know that we have work to do in God's name if we want to live.

MLK says, on taking a position against The Vietnam War 1967:

"Cowardice asks the question, 'Is it safe?' Expediency asks the question, 'Is it politic?' Vanity asks the question, 'Is it popular?' But conscience asks the question, 'Is it right?' And there comes a time when one must take a position that is neither safe, nor politic, nor popular, but s/he must take it because conscience tells her/him that it is right."

CHURCH COUNCIL UPDATE January 2025

Church Council Meeting Summary from January 14, 2025

Spiritual Reflection and Prayer: Rev. Schroer shared several stories about the youth mentor retreat with the topic of environmental justice. Council reflected on justice and injustice in the world today.

Minutes were approved from the December 10 meeting.

Treasurer's Report was discussed. Brian Amstutz made a recommendation to move the surplus funds from 2024 to facilities reserve, disaster relief, and memorial funds. Julie Finney made a motion to propose this movement of funds from surplus to the appropriate funds and Jason Ayers seconded. Vote was approved. Treasurer's report was approved subject to audit. The full report is on file.

Council will be asking the congregation to support a goal of \$2,500 for March Special Offering for California Fire relief.

Pastor and Staff reports are on file. Pastor Joyce will be out March 9th and March 16th, and we will need pulpit supply.

Committee Reports:

Worship/Faith - Terri was not present. Kid's Club will take a break between holidays.

Care/Community – Julie ICU has 5 new members. Merry Cooks did 3 meals in December. The Fellowship Committee has begun preparations for the Daughters' Dinner (March 1) around the theme of HER story. **Mission/Outreach** – Mollie Has been working on building the committee. Salvation Army has 8 beds. 6 additional beds were delivered to Salvation Army January 2025. Another bed build will be scheduled, possibly in April 2025. The Wayne County Health Department is looking for a possible site for a pop-up market. Mollie has contacted them to let them know our parking lot is available.

Administration/Resources – The company repairing the bell tower has completed the bracing and are just waiting on the weather to break to finish. Joe is contacting Wayne Siding regarding the South entrance.

New Business:

The revised "Bridge Pastor Contract/Covenant Agreement for 2025" has been completed and signed. **Julie and Dwaine will be leading the committee to review the Constitution** and By-Laws that is done every 5 years.

Discussion was had regarding door security. Jason to look into adding cameras onto exterior doors. Jason to also look into changing the locks. Once information is gathered, we can discuss a roll out plan to the congregation.

The annual report will need finalized and published for the congregation by end of February.

Next meeting is February 11, 7 PM.

An Ad Hoc Committee spent much of 2024 reviewing and updating policies and procedures for Christ Church to align with the revised constitution. The Church Council would like to share some of these updated policies with the congregation. We are beginning with the weather-related policy:

- 1. Youth programs are cancelled if Orrville City Schools are closed.
- 2. If Wayne County is on a Level 2 Alert, all church programming will be cancelled for that day. This includes worship services, Sunday school classes, and any other church activities.
- 3. If a Level 2 Alert occurs on a weekday, the church offices will be closed.
- 4. A message will be sent through "The Chat" updating members of closures. Members wishing to receive "The Chat" may contact the church office.
